What a Character!

HELLO, FAMILY!

Over the next three weeks, our class will build their knowledge about story characters and what makes them unique, with a focus on the realistic fiction genre. We will read texts about interesting characters who are true to themselves when faced with a challenge. Children will also write an expository essay about how authors make their characters interesting to readers.

BRING IT HOME! Learning fun for the whole family!

Discuss the Topic

Set aside time daily for your child to share with you what he or she is learning. Use these ideas to help build your child's knowledge about the topic:

- Talk about the ideas your child has added to the Knowledge Map each week.
- Ask about the texts your child is reading, and what he or she has learned from them.
- Share with your child your own questions about the topic, and work together to find the answers.

Explore the Genre

The genre focus in this module is realistic fiction. Discuss with your child the characteristics of this genre.

Ask your child to read to you each day and make time to read together.

Look for texts that:

- Spark your child's curiosity.
- Tie to the module topic.
- Tell about characters who are unique, just like your child.
- Reflect problems or concerns that your child may recognize or need to confront.

Build Vocabulary

Use these ideas to help your child build a rich vocabulary.

The Big Idea Reinforce the topic words individuality, unique, feature, and personality in everyday conversations with your child. Use prompts like these: What is one way you are unique? Describe a feature that you look for in a friend.

What Does It Mean? Have your child keep a growing list of the Critical Vocabulary words. Quiz each other on their meanings.

Word Hunt Look for words with the prefixes *mis*–, *un*–, and *non*– and the suffixes –*ful* and –*less* in books, magazines, online texts, and environmental print.

Summer Reading Choice Board Activities

Draw/create a picture of 2 characters from your book choice on a poster board. Next, surround your drawings with words (adjectives) that describe each of the characters.

Write a Friendly Letter to the author on white lined paper. Be sure to include: the date, greeting, body, and closing. Introduce yourself first by sharing a few fun facts about things you enjoy. Then ask at least three questions you might have about the book.

Design an original poster advertising your book choice. Your poster should persuade others to read it! Include the title, author, and an exciting picture/s. Make sure it is colorful and grabs the attention of others

Create an original poem, rap, or song about a character or event in the book you selected. This should be done on white lined paper. We can't wait to hear it!

Make a Double Bubble
Map to compare and
contrast this book to
another book you have
read. How were they
similar? How were they
different? Be sure to
include examples.

Where did your story selection take place? Create a picture that illustrates the setting, and then explain using details what your setting depicts/shows.

Who was your favorite character in the book you chose? First, create a Bubble Map which includes characteristics/adjectives that describe this character. Next, write a letter to this character and include examples of why you selected these specific characteristics/traits.

Time to be a Vocabulary Word Detective! Select at least 8 - 10 new words you learned from the book you read and create a dictionary with the words. Include: word meanings and pictures illustrating your understanding as well. Be creative!

Your friends would love to know your thoughts on the book you selected to read. Write a book review that explains in detail why you would or wouldn't recommend this book. Be sure to support your opinions with evidence from the text. This should be done on white lined paper.

Summer Math Problems

Directions; Read the word problems. Before completing the problems, carefully read the checklist provided. Show all of your work on paper and attach the question sheet.

Checklist

- Circle the important information
- Underline what the question is asking you to do
- Explain the steps you took to arrive at your answer
- Label all of your answers

- Amy's mother told her she can stay at dance class for 20 more minutes before they had to leave. First she practiced ballet for 7 minutes. Then she changed into her tap shoes which took 1 minute. Then she practiced tap dancing for 8 minutes. How much longer can Amy stay at dance class?
 Show all of your work.
- Mrs. Dunnigan sold pineapples at a farmer's market. There
 were 5 pineapples in each box. She sold 6 boxes! If she sold
 an equal number of pineapples to 10 people, how many
 pineapples did each person buy? How do you know?

- Mr. Grossman loves to walk his dog around the block. It takes 7 minutes to walk around the block once. Every night, Mr. Grossman walks his dog around the block 3 times. Altogether, how long does it take Mr. Grossman to walk his dog over a 3 day period?
- Emma has 25 pretzels. She put an equal number of pretzels on 4 plates. How many pretzels did Emma place on each plate? Were any left over? Explain and show all of your work.
- Dino loves cookies! He bakes 2 dozen oatmeal cookies, 2 dozen chocolate chip cookies, and 1 dozen sugar cookies.
 - A. How many cookies did Dino bake in all?
 - B. If he gives away 12 oatmeal cookies, 8 chocolate chip cookies, and 6 sugar cookies, how many of each will he have left for himself?

(1 dozen = 12)
